

#### Introduction from the SCAR Secretariat

Welcome to our June newsletter!

Earlier this month polar scientists made <u>a call for urgent intensification of national and international research</u> in the polar regions due to the rapid changes occurring in the Arctic and Antarctica. The call came from polar scientists attending the annual meetings of the <u>Scientific Committee on Antarctic Research/Climate and Cryosphere Sea ice Working Group</u> and the <u>Arctic Sea Ice Working Group</u>, which coincided with the Antarctic Treaty Consultative Meeting.

The <u>45th Antarctic Treaty Consultative Meeting (ATCM)</u> and 25th Meeting of the Committee on Environmental Protection (CEP) concluded in Helsinki, Finland, earlier this month. This year's SCAR lecture was delivered by Dr Heather Lynch on satellite-based science and the changing nature of Antarctic exploration. Additionally, Prof Steven L Chown presented an update on the Antarctic Climate Change and the Environment Decadal Synopsis during a joint ATCM/CEP session on Climate Change. You can access both lectures in our <u>SCAR library</u>.

Applications for the 2023 SCAR Visiting Scholar scheme are now open! Designed for mid- to late-career scholars, this program is part of SCAR's capacity building efforts and offers an opportunity for a short visit to an institute(s) in a SCAR member country. This newsletter also features a report from Dr Ted Scambos, a SCAR Visiting Scholar who recently visited Argentina as part of the programme. For those of you earlier in your career, don't forget that the application deadline for the 2023 SCAR Fellowships is 31 July 2023.

# Polar scientists call for urgent action in view of rapid Arctic and Antarctic change

Polar scientists are calling for an urgent intensification of national and international research and observational capabilities in view of rapid Arctic and Antarctic change.

More than 60 experts from 41 institutions and 14 countries attended the annual meetings of the Scientific Committee on Antarctic Research/Climate and Cryosphere Sea ice Working Group and the Arctic Sea Ice Working Group after a 4 year COVID-19 hiatus. The polar scientists called for sustained long-term

observatories and research to fill the information gaps in both polar sea-ice zones. Multi-national design and coordination are required to optimise field observations and research synthesis, as well as to deliver robust and impactful outcomes.

## SCAR to host new Decade Collaborative Centre

SCAR will host a new Decade Collaborative
Centre for the Southern Ocean Region (DCC-SOR), joining the global ecosystem of the United
Nations Decade of Ocean Science for
Sustainable Development 2021-2030 (the 'Ocean
Decade'). The DCC-SOR will be key in
coordinating international efforts to protect and
conserve the Southern Ocean. SCAR is a longstanding partner of UNECSO's Intergovernmental
Oceanographic Commission.





#### SCAR attends ATCM/CEP meetings in Helsinki

From 28 May to 8 June, Finland hosted the XLV Antarctic Treaty Consultative Meeting (ATCM) as well as the XXV meeting of the Committee for Environmental Protection (CEP). The Helsinki Declaration on Climate Change in the Antarctic was adopted on the last day of the meeting. The SCAR lecture was presented by Dr Heather Lynch. Prof Steven L Chown gave an update on the Antarctic Climate Change and the Environment Decadal Synopsis.

# Dr Ted Scambos reports on his Visiting Scholarship

SCAR is pleased to share the <u>Visiting Scholar</u> report by Dr Ted Scambos. His Visiting Scholarship was hosted by the Instituto Antártico Argentino (IAA), Argentina, supported by Sebastián Marinsek. Dr Scambos' visit was to prepare for potential field work in the Larsen B embayment region, focusing on analysing calving styles, monitoring elevation and ice flow velocity changes, and assessing present-day ocean properties adjacent to the glaciers.





# SCAR co-organises UNFCCC SB58 side event, 8th June

SCAR, ICCI and ICIMOD <u>hosted a side event</u> at the UNFCCC World Climate Conference SB58 in Bonn, Germany, titled "Loss of Mountain Water Resources and Sea-level Rise: Why 2°C is Too High for 3.5 Billion". <u>The event was livestreamed</u> and can be watched online.

- On 19 June the third <u>World Albatross Day</u> was celebrated online around the globe. This year's theme was "Plastic Pollution" following "Climate Change" (2022), "Ensuring Albatross-friendly Fisheries" (2021), "Eradicating Island Pests" (2020). SCAR has published on the issue of POPs, plastics and seabirds in the past. Additionally, the ImPACT Action Group aims to facilitate coordinated investigation of chemical input to the Antarctic region. You can find <u>resources on these issues on our website</u>.

  workshop was the latest update under a broader krill work program that
  was agreed upon in 2019 by members of the Commission for the
