Bids to Host the SCAR 2020 Open Science Conference and the XXXV SCAR Delegates Meeting

Executive Summary

Important Issues or Factors:

Since 2004, SCAR has been holding an Open Science Conference together with its Biennial Delegates Meeting. The 2018 meetings will be held in conjunction with the Arctic Science Summit Week and the International Arctic Science Committee (IASC) in Davos, Switzerland. It has been tradition, when possible, that the COMNAP Annual General Meeting is also held with the SCAR meetings. For 2016 and 2018 the meetings were not held jointly as COMNAP rules require their meetings to be hosted in COMNAP member countries and Malaysia (2016) and Switzerland (2018) are not currently members of COMNAP.

Australia has submitted a bid to host the 2020 meetings in Hobart. Australia is a member of both SCAR and COMNAP, thus the bid includes hosting both meetings. Australia also graciously hosted the 2006 SCAR meetings in Hobart.

SCAR has received a letter of interest for the 2022 meetings from India.

Recommendations/Actions and Justification:

The Delegates are asked to consider the bid from Australia for hosting the 2020 meetings.

Budget Implications:

SCAR funds are usually provided to some degree for these meetings.

PROPOSAL FOR AUSTRALIA TO HOST THE SCIENTIFIC COMMITTEE ON ANTARCTIC RESEARCH (SCAR) OPEN SCIENCE CONFERENCE (OSC) IN HOBART IN AUGUST 2020

I wish to advise you that Australia intends to bid to host the SCAR OSC and related events, including the Council of Managers of National Antarctic Programs (COMNAP) Annual General Meeting (AGM) in 2020.

Our proposed venue for the SCAR OSC and most related events will be the Hotel Grand Chancellor in Hobart, with the COMNAP AGM to be held at the headquarters of the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Living Marine Resources (CCAMLR), which is a short walk from the Hotel. Both venues have breakout rooms that are suitable for side events. Social events will be held at various locations on the Hobart waterfront and possibly at the internationally-renowned Museum of Old and New Art (MONA) which is a short ferry ride from Hobart's waterfront.

The 2006 SCAR OSC and associated events were held in Hobart, but since that time the city has progressed significantly as an Antarctic hub, and also as a centre for cultural and tourist activities. Since 2006, Hobart has become an important hub for aviation across Eastern Antarctica through the Antarctic Airlink to Wilkins aerodrome near Casey Station. The Institute of Marine and Antarctic Studies (IMAS) was established in 2010 and is now located in a spectacular new building on the Hobart waterfront, which is also home to the Antarctic Climate and Ecosystems Cooperative Research Centre (ACE CRC). Hobart is now the home to hundreds of Antarctic and Southern Ocean scientists, and there will be many opportunities for collaborative visits, and for scientists to organise specialised workshops and meetings on either side of the OSC in collaboration with Australian partners.

Australia has long been an active contributor to Antarctic research and to SCAR-facilitated science across all of the organization's strategic areas of interest. International collaboration is central to Australia's approach, reflected by a wide array of science and logistic collaborations with partners from around the globe. In April 2016, the Australian Government announced a new 20 year Antarctic Strategic Plan, which provides enhanced funding for Antarctic science and operations, with a focus on ice core drilling, inland traverse, and scoping of expanded aviation services. In April 2016, the Australian Government also signed a contract for a new, state of the art icebreaker to be delivered in 2020. This powerful and capable research and operational vessel will be completed in time for the SCAR OSC and will be the location for some of the conference's social activities.


Since the conference was last here in 2006, so much about Tasmania has changed. There is no doubt that the 2011 opening of MONA (Museum of Old and New Art); Australia's largest privately owned museum has played a major role in the growing worldwide interest in Australia's beautiful island state. The increased interest from around the globe, and significant surge in visitor numbers to Tasmania has led to a heightened sense of pride among tourism operators and locals alike. Tasmania has welcomed the challenge and is delivering with a number of significant, new and exciting products on the market.

Offsite venues such as Princes Wharf No.1, Macquarie Wharf No.2 and Brooke Street Pier, all walking distance from the Hotel Grand Chancellor Hobart, provide fantastic new locations for social events. A number of new hotels are scheduled for completion in 2017-2018, offering more choice for. For those wishing to holiday in Tasmania pre- or post-conference, Saffire Freycinet, on Tasmania's East Coast was recently named the World's Best Boutique Hotel and the Tamar Valley in the state's north was recently awarded the people's choice Best Food Region by Australian Traveller Magazine.

Tasmania's increase in popularity has been backed by winning awards both nationally and internationally including recently being named in the world's "Top 10 Regions in the World to Visit in 2015" in Lonely Planet's *Best in Travel* 2015 publication. The island offers some of the world's cleanest air, purest water, finest produce and most breathtaking scenery. I have attached a short document outlining Australia's proposal for hosting the SCAR OSC, COMNAP AGM and other associated events. I will bring a more detailed prospectus and short video to the SCAR Delegate's meeting in Kuala Lumpur.

I hope that this proposal gains the approval of SCAR Delegates, and that there will be an opportunity for Hobart, Australia's Antarctic Gateway, to host a terrific event in 2020.

HOBART, GATEWAY TO EAST ANTARCTICA

Hobart, Tasmania's capital city is a blend of heritage and lifestyle, spectacular scenery and vibrant culture. Hobart is a cosmopolitan city linked to mountain, river and sea, it is spinnakers on the water and fish punts at the docks, coffee under the sun umbrellas at Salamanca and an occasional frosting of snow on Mount Wellington.

Hobart is a contemporary convention city, with all the facilities you would expect from a large city and is the gateway to southern Tasmania. With conference venues to suit all conference sizes and budgets from 10 to 1100 Attendees, the city also offers a range of accommodation options from hostel to five-star hotels. A diverse range of venues, access to living history, unique food and wine experiences, and the credibility gained through hosting successful conventions.

Hobart is the leading gateway city for the East Antarctic region, which extends from the Ross Sea to Dronning Maud Land. It is a major world centre for Antarctic and Southern Ocean scientific research: home to the Australian Antarctic Division, the Antarctic Climate and Ecosystems Cooperative Research Centre and the Institute of Marine and Antarctic Studies and CSIRO Marine and Atmospheric Research. These institutions employ hundreds of researchers undertaking globally-significant work in Antarctica and the Southern Ocean. The hosting of the SCAR OSC and related events in Hobart will provide an opportunity for visiting and Hobart-based scientists to organise further specialised workshops and meetings on either side of the main event.

Along with the Australian national Antarctic program, Hobart is the home port for Antarctic resupply voyages undertaken to Dumont d'Urville Station by the French Antarctic program as conducted by the Institut Polaire Francais Paul-Emile Victor. It is also frequently visited by vessels from the Korean, US and Chinese Antarctic programs and by a number of other Southern Ocean research vessels.

Hobart's role as a centre of operations has expanded significantly since 2006, it has become a major aviation gateway to Eastern Antarctica. The Australian Antarctic Program's Airlink operates A319 Airbus and Royal Australian Airforce C17A Globemaster flights between the Hobart Airport and Wilkins aerodrome in Antarctica, which itself serves a hub for connecting aviation services operated by Australia and other nations across a large part of the continent. The Australian Government's 20 Year Antarctic Strategic Plan, announced in April 2016, provides for further work towards year-round aviation access to Eastern Antarctica, as well as investing in significantly upscaling Australia's ice core drilling capabilities and supporting inland traverse operations.

The Port of Hobart, which is within walking distance to our proposed venue for the Conference, is also undergoing a significant redevelopment, with the opening in 2013 of a world class Cargo and Biosecurity Centre for Australian Antarctic program operations. The number of Antarctic vessels visiting Hobart each summer has been steadily increasing over recent years and the Port is responding to this international Antarctic demand.

From early in 2020, the Port of Hobart will provide a permanent home for the new state of the art Australian icebreaker, one of the largest, most powerful and most capable vessels ever to support Antarctic science and operations. We plan to make tours and other events on the vessel an important part of Conference activities. Hobart is also the home to the RV Investigator, a new, highly capable national marine research vessel which works around Australia and in the Southern Ocean. Depending on its schedule, this vessel might also be berthed in Hobart during part or all of the OSC.

Adjacent to the Port, work will be nearing completion on a world class facility which will accommodate Antarctic related research support and tourism activities.

PROPOSED DATES

The event(s) will be held in August, preferably starting on a Friday or Saturday.

Wintertime in Tasmania is alive and vibrant - offering attendees a unique experience. What you may not know, is that while it may be cold, Tasmania has many crisp, clear blue winter skies during winter that are perfect for sightseeing and enjoying outdoor activities. Indeed Tasmania's natural rugged beauty is at its best during wintertime.

LOCAL CONFERENCE ORGANISERS

The Local Organising Committee (LOC) will comprise of representatives from local institutions involved in SCAR, the AAD, Antarctic Tasmania and the local Antarctic sector. HOBART CONFERENCE VENUES

Hobart has conference venues to suit all meeting sizes and budgets. The following venues have been proposed to host the SCAR OSC and related events.

Hotel Grand Chancellor Hobart

240 rooms | 4.5 star

The Hotel Grand Chancellors Federation Concert Hall and Convention Centre takes pride of place on Hobart's waterfront. The venue features a tiered auditorium for 1100 people, exhibition hall for 110 booths and another eight versatile meeting and function rooms. For groups from 10 to 1100, the Federation Concert Hall and Convention Centre offers all the amenities you would expect of a modern, world class venue.

Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR) Secretariat

CCAMLR has no accommodation onsite but many accommodation options within close walking distance. The home of CCAMLR, which was once an old school, dates back to 1842. CCAMLR hosts more than 250 international delegates at its annual general meeting as well as various other meetings and seminars. A number of conference rooms are available for use along with communal spaces for breaks.

ACCOMMODATION HOBART

Tasmanian Whisky Tours

Tasmanian Whisky Tours gives you the opportunity to visit 3-4 distilleries in a single day, to taste up to ten Tasmanian single malt whiskies, to meet the whisky makers and to go behind the scenes of the distillation process. All while being guided and driven through spectacular Tasmanian landscapes from the Derwent Valley to the Central Highlands to the Tasman Peninsula. Seven of the nine distilleries are in Southern Tasmanian and on each tour you will have the opportunity to visit the estates, tour the distilleries and enjoy an inclusive picnic lunch of seasonal local Tasmanian produce.

Bangor Wine and Oyster Shed

The Bangor Wine & Oyster Shed is a new venue on a 15,000 acre working farm. The 'shed' overlooks the vineyard and clear waters of the Tasman Peninsular. The venue has been carefully designed to reflect the character and warmth of a traditional Tasmanian farm building. Specialising in wine and oysters, the menu also features abalone, Tasmanian seafood's, cheeses, beef dishes from Bangor raised beef.

Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery (TMAG)

The second oldest museum in Australia, TMAG has its origins in the collection of the country's oldest scientific collection- the Royal Society of Tasmania which was established in 1843. TMAG redevelopment which includes more than 2000 square metres of new public and exhibition spaces, a centralised visitor hub and new courtyard café.

History Experiences

Port Arthur Historic Site

The Port Arthur experience is unforgettable. Just a one and half hour drive from Hobart, a visit to Port Arthur Historic Site is Tasmania's iconic cultural heritage experience. The Port Arthur Historic Site has more than 30 buildings, ruins, and restored period homes dating from the prisons establishment in 1830 until its closure in 1877. During this time around 12,500 convicts served sentences.
